

Socotra Archipelago, Yemen





Area: ~3625 sqkm (max length ~130km, max width ~40km)

Population: ~ 45.000 (historically always present)

Highest Mountain: ~1500m a.s.l.

IMPORTANT THINGS TO KNOW

- No access by sea for 5 months a year (due to strong winds and high seas)
- Unique language, culture, traditions due to historic isolation
- Access by civil aviation only as of mid 1999 (Only a gravel airstrip until mid 1999 irregular military flights only)
- Isolated and inaccessible throughout its history, until 1994
- First asphalt road being built
- Inhabited for thousands of years. People had no choice but to live in balance with their natural resources – until present

Socotri people have traditional ways to conserve their natural resources

They have preserved the Biodiversity of Socotra until today




























Rainfall and Ground Water Table Data Collection Network
